

### *Your Priest's Perspective*

When Dale and I go hiking in Colorado, each trail takes us through several different mini-environments. Typically, we begin in a dense forest, walking on damp earth finding our way among wildflowers beside a creek that will lead us to a waterfall that we cannot see, but whose soft roar fills the air. As the trail becomes more steep, we find our selves on a more narrow and rocky path, gradually able to see over the trees. Eventually, we are above the tree line, able to look down on the waterfall whose sound had guided us through the forest, able even to see other lakes in the distance; the light is brighter, the land is more barren, and the views more grand. As we wind around the mountain each view is breathtaking, but it is only when we get to the top of the mountain that we realize that we had only see parts of a vista; from there, we can see 360 degrees, and all views that we had enjoyed along the way were just parts of a larger vision.

I thought about St. John's and about the larger Episcopal Church as I hiked this summer. We can get caught up in our immediate concerns—the integrity of our building, the way we teach our children, the health of the people we love, the efficiency and consistency with which we conduct our business. But as we travel together in our faith, what loomed large seems smaller; the waterfall —whatever our deeper hope may be- suddenly looms before us in all its grandeur, and in the light of God's grace we see more accurately the true proportion of all the different pieces of our world. At the same time, at any given moment our view is only partial; at best, we see only 180 degrees, and around the bend there will be a scene we cannot yet imagine.

St. John's is called to be the Body of Christ in this place and at this time: to walk a path that winds and climbs, a path that continually changes and shows us scenes that we have not anticipated. We are here to comfort those who mourn, to feed those who are hungry, to guide those who are lost, to hold accountable those who abuse their authority. We are here to make God's presence unmistakably felt—in our beautiful building, in our welcoming practices, in our contributions to the food pantry and Community Missions, in our support to the schools, in our fellowship with other churches. We are here to help one another walk faithfully with God, whatever our questions and our doubts and our fears. We are called to profound responsibility, to open our hearts and minds in ways we have not yet anticipated; we are also profoundly blessed to be here, together.

The Episcopal Church is similarly called to be the Body of Christ in this time and in this place. Those who attended and voted at General Convention in July were profoundly faithful to this vocation. The Presiding Bishop's letter about the Convention is included in this newsletter, and I urge you to take the time to read it. As she points out, the many different decisions made by our delegates consistently reflect our call to serve with a vision larger than any single individual or group can comprehend. Even in acknowledging our limited size and resources, we re-affirmed our commitment to address domestic and global poverty, to be both more rigorous and more pastoral in our canonical discipline, and to honor more persons in our calendar of saints. In agreeing that we will not presume to exclude anyone categorically from a call to ordained ministry or to intimate relationships we also acknowledge our humility in relation to the infinite mystery of God. Our call to hold one another accountable for living faithfully is too profound. We cannot simply decide that we don't want to bother; we cannot pretend to know the heart of God. To be the Body of Christ, to embody the gospel, is to grow into the profound truth that no one of us is excluded from God's embrace, and that our path will continue to change and our vision to expand until we reach a place where we can what currently lies hidden around the bend.

## From the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church

My brothers and sisters in Christ:

The 76th General Convention is now history, though it will likely take some time before we are all reasonably clear about what the results are.

We gathered in Anaheim, as guests of the Diocese of Los Angeles, for eleven full days of worship, learning, and policy-making. The worship was stunning visually, musically, and liturgically, with provocative preaching and lively singing.

Our learning included training in Public Narrative, as well as news about the emergent church, in the LA Night presentation.

We welcomed a number of visitors from other parts of the Anglican Communion, including 15 of the primates (archbishops or presiding bishops), other bishops, clergy, and laity.

The budget adopted represents a significant curtailment of church-wide ministry efforts, in recognition of the economic realities of many dioceses and church endowments, which will result in the loss of a number of Church Center staff who have given long and laudable service. Yet we will continue to serve God's mission, throughout The Episcopal Church and beyond. This budget expects that more mission work will continue or begin to take place at diocesan or congregational levels. Religious pilgrims, from the Israelites in the desert to Episcopalians in Alaska or Haiti, have always learned that times of leanness are opportunities for strengthened faith and creativity.

As a Church, we have deepened our commitments to mission and ministry with "the least of these" (Matthew 25). We included a budgetary commitment of 0.7% to the Millennium Development Goals, through the NetsforLife® program partnership of Episcopal Relief & Development. That is in addition to approximately 15% of the budget already committed to international development work.

We have committed to a domestic poverty initiative, meant to explore coherent and constructive responses to some of the worst poverty statistics in the Americas: Native American reservations and indigenous communities.

Justice is the goal, as we revised our canons (church rules) having to do with clergy discipline, both as an act of solidarity with those who may suffer at the hands of clergy and an act of pastoral concern for clergy charged with misconduct.

The General Convention adopted a health plan to serve all clergy and lay employees, which is expected to be a cost-savings across the whole of the United States portion of the Church. Work continues to ensure adequate health coverage in the non-U.S. parts of this Church. The Convention also mandated pension coverage for lay employees.

Liturgical additions were also included in the Convention's work, from more saints on the calendar to prayers around reproductive loss.

What captured the headlines across the secular media, however, had to do with two resolutions, the consequences of which were often misinterpreted or exaggerated. One, identified as D025, is titled "Anglican Communion: Commitment and Witness to Anglican Communion." It reaffirms our commitment to and desire to pursue mission with the Anglican Communion; reiterates our commitment to Listening Process urged by Lambeth Conferences of 1978, 1988, and 1998; notes that our own participation in the listening process led General Convention in 2000 to "recognize that the baptized membership of The Episcopal Church includes same-sex couples living in lifelong committed relationships 'characterized by fidelity, monogamy, mutual affection and respect, careful, honest communication, and the holy love which enables those in such relationships to see in each other the image of God' "; recognizes that ministry, both lay and ordained is being exercised by such persons in response to God's call; notes that the call to ordained ministry is God's call, is a mystery, and that the Church participates in that mystery through the process of discernment; acknowledges that the members of The Episcopal Church, and of the Anglican Communion, are not of one mind, and that faithful Christians disagree about some of these matters.

The other resolution that received a lot of press is C056, titled "Liturgies for Blessings." The text adopted was a substitute for the original, yet the title remains unchanged. It acknowledges changing circumstances in the U.S. and elsewhere, in that civil jurisdictions in some places permit marriage, civil unions, and/or domestic

partnerships involving same-sex couples, that call for a pastoral response from this Church; asks the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, and the House of Bishops, to collect and develop theological and liturgical resources for such pastoral response, and report to the next General Convention; asks those bodies to invite comment and participation from other parts of this Church and the Anglican Communion; notes that bishops may provide generous pastoral responses to the needs of members of this Church; asks the Convention to honor the theological diversity of this Church in regard to matters of human sexuality.

I urge you to read them for yourself. Some have insisted that these resolutions repudiate our relationships with other members of the Anglican Communion. My sense is that we have been very clear that we value our relationships within and around the Communion, and seek to deepen them. My sense as well is that we cannot do that without being honest about who and where we are. We are obviously not of one mind, and likely will not be until Jesus returns in all his glory. We are called by God to continue to wrestle with the circumstances in which we live and move and have our being, and to do it as carefully and faithfully as we are able, in companionship with those who disagree vehemently and agree wholeheartedly. It is only in that wrestling that we, like Jacob, will begin to discern the leading of the Spirit and the blessing of relationship with God.

Above all else, this Convention claimed God's mission as the heartbeat of The Episcopal Church. I encourage every member of this Church to enter into conversation in your own congregation or diocese about God's mission, and where you and your faith community are being invited to enter more deeply into caring for your neighbors, the "least of these" whom Jesus befriends.

Hi! My name is Dan Anger. I've been a member of St. Andrew's for over 18 years. I led the diocesan program to send bibles to China about 10 years ago, and I have been the leader of various study groups at St. Andrew's and St. John's-Wilson. I recently took early retirement from full-time college teaching, but I continue to work in a private counseling practice in Tonawanda and Wilson.

I am proposing a Niagara Deanery study group, beginning in September 2009, that would meet on Sunday evenings about twice a month. The first orientation meeting would be at St. John's, but meetings could rotate among the churches at the preference of the group participants. Because we will be sharing what is sacred to each of us, there is an expectation of respect within the group and confidentiality outside the group. Each person will need to make the group participation a high priority, and regular attendance will be expected. Each person will be challenged for full sharing, giving and receiving: No observers only, please. Our purpose is to build a community.

This will be a support group in which participants encourage and support each other in their individual spiritual journeys, to learn to walk with God in their daily lives. My calling is to provide leadership for the Deanery to provide an opportunity for spiritual growth and development. My skills of sharing personal faith experience, managing group dynamics for positive learning, and facilitating individualized experiential growth are at the full disposal of the Holy Spirit.

I don't propose a formal curriculum or a specific book at this point, although this could develop out of our conversation. We will begin with each member sharing their personal grounding of belief in God with 3 Bible verses, and then lots of group reflection to digest these verses. Then we'll move on to research what the church fathers and current writers have to say on the topics our bible verses have raised. Our purpose will be to keep the focus of the group on personalized learning and to explore how our beliefs function in our daily lives. Our community will be based on the premise that if each of us can articulate our personal faith, maybe others can hear the Word of God more clearly.
