wander the depths


or where the stars reside

Deanery Outreach Project – October 18, 2011

Following our custom of supporting an outreach project at each Deanery Council meeting, we will bring items for two organizations to the Niagara Deanery Pre-Convention Workshop on October 18. We will be collecting hats, mittens and scarves for Journeys End. This organization helps immigrants get settled in Buffalo, assisting them with finding apartments, getting enrolled in school, learning English, preparing for job interviews and other training. Many of the people who are assisted through Journey's End are political refugees, and many have spent time in refugee camps. They usually arrive with little more than the clothes on their backs. Our Western New York winters are difficult for them without warm clothing. So we try to do our small part to warm them up with mittens, hats and scarves. We will also collect any non perishable foods to be donated to the Community Missions Soup Kitchen.

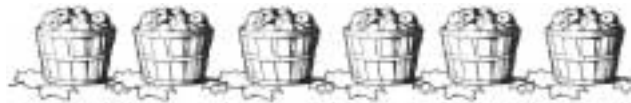
We will have a basket in the Parish Hall for collection on Tuesday the 18th.

The Importance of CPR: Are we our brothers' keepers?

When I was 19 years old, I had an unusual experience at the Grand Opening of a new bank in our small town in Vermont. As people walked in to enjoy the festivities of food and information, a man who was about 50 years old suddenly collapsed on the floor.

This was the first time I had witnessed and participated in this type of sudden event. The father of a classmate (a physician) spoke with an authoritative voice: "Judi, go to my car and get my bag." My heart was pounding as I raced out. Upon returning, Dr. Jackson was starting CPR (chest compressions), and his wife Naomi was providing breathing. As I walked in, I was instructed to open the bag and retrieve a scalpel. (I was unable to locate it quickly). Dr. Jackson was then able to perform a tracheotomy right there and to open the airway.

I learned what a great benefit knowledge can be to save lives, no matter where you are. This incident was instrumental in changing my career plans from art studies in Boston to nursing.

There are many unexpected times in our lives when quick, calm, and educated action can save the life of another person, no matter what age or where you are.

On October 15th a CPR course is being offered by the Red Cross at St. Andrew's, under the Parish Nurse education program. The cost of the program is only \$20, and all participants will receive a 2-year certification card at the completion of the course. Only 20 people can enroll.

I especially encourage the youth and adults of St. John's and St. Andrew's, as well as community members, to attend. You *can* be your brother's and sister's keeper.

Operation Christmas Child

It is that time of year again to start thinking about Operation Christmas Child. This year's campaign runs from November 14 through November 21, 2011.

On **Saturday, November 5**, St. Andrew's and St. John's (children of all ages... that means adults as well) will come together for our annual Operation Christmas Child extravaganza. We will prepare and pack up shoebox Christmas gifts and enjoy lunch and fellowship together.

As most of you know, Operation Christmas Child is sponsored by Samaritan's Purse (www.samaritanspurse.org). The idea is to create Christmas shoeboxes for children 2- 14 years old to be shipped around the world to needy children.

You can be a part of this in many ways:

- You and your family can make up your own box(es) or bring your gifts to St. John's on November 5th to join with us as we all put our boxes together (boxes are for a boy or a girl and marked as such).
- You can donate monetarily towards gifts. Several of us will go shopping before November 5th to get the gifts we need to stuff the boxes. In addition it costs **\$7.00 to mail one box** so money for shipping expenses will also be needed. In order to have another successful year, we will need to raise **at least \$1000**. Please make checks payable to St. John's and mark in the memo line what the funds are for.
- You can come on November 5 and enjoy fellowship and lunch at 10:30 a.m. at St. John's where we will pool our resources and put the boxes together to be shipped.

Here are some gifts suggested by Samaritan's Purse:

TOYS – small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yo's, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch, toys that light up or make noise, Slinky, etc (make sure you include extra batteries if the toy requires them)

SCHOOL SUPPLIES- pens, pencils and sharpener, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pads, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books

HYGIENE ITEMS – toothbrush, toothpaste, bar soap (in a plastic bag), comb, washcloth

OTHER – hard candy or suckers (double bagged), mints, gum, t-shirts, socks, ball caps, sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights

We will also need Christmas wrapping paper, scotch tape, shoeboxes (regular sized), or plastic bins, large rubber bands for wrapping the boxes. Bring your own scissors if you will be wrapping boxes.

Things not to include: used or damaged items, war-related items, chocolate, food, liquids, lotions, medications, vitamins, breakable items, aerosol cans.

A sign-up sheet will be in both parishes so we can get a head count for lunch. Don't miss this great day for you and your kids!!!

Outreach - Community Missions



This is just a reminder that it is time again to fill the Toy Box at the Mission. As many of you already know, small unwrapped toys are needed for this purpose. Children who come for refuge are allowed to choose one toy; they often have nothing when they arrive. Soft toys as well as toys for older children are needed. Please put the toys into the basket at the back of the church before December 11. They will be taken to Niagara Falls that week.



Personal hygiene bags are needed regularly at Community Missions. We are always in need of soaps, shampoo, deodorant, Kleenex, combs and razors. The travel size is just right for including in the bags. Small coloring or activity books are used for the children's bags. You may put your donations in the basket at the back of the sanctuary or hand them to one of us. We took about 50 bags the last time.

These are eight important ways we can contribute toward whole and healthy relationships. They cost nothing, yet they may well be the most valuable gifts we can ever offer another.

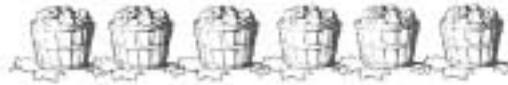
