Your Priest's Perspective

After the jubilant celebration of Candlemas Day on February 1st, we begin to prepare for Lent. On Sundays in February, we read of Jesus' miracles with repeated reminders of the danger that he faces in his ministry and cautions for secrecy. Even our preparation for our Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper involves clearing our physical and spiritual cupboards of extras that we do not need. (The tradition of Shrove Tuesday suppers developed as a way of using up the flour, eggs, butter, and meat that would not be used for the more austere meals that families would have during Lent.)


I hope that Lent at St. John's will be a time when we can pause and reflect on the abundant grace that we have, finding peace in distinguishing between what we *need* and what we *want*. The greatest teachers in the Christian tradition for understanding that difference were the men and women who lived as monks in community or hermits in solitude in the desert 1700 years ago. Disturbed by what they perceived to be dangerous worldliness in the church under the rule and conversion of Constantine in the fourth century, they retreated to the desert to live in austere simplicity. Their sayings are surprisingly relevant today, guiding us to trust our strength, to clarify our needs, and to be absolutely honest with ourselves.

The teachings of our Desert Mothers and Fathers will be the subject of our Lenten reflection groups. One group will meet on Thursday mornings after our 11 a.m. Eucharist at St. John's and another will meet on Monday evenings at St. Andrew's at 7 p.m. A third group, with a slightly different focus will meet on Monday mornings at 10 a.m. at St. Andrew's. Our discussions will be based on Rowan Williams' *Where God Happens*, combined with the meditations in a booklet—*Peace and Compassion: To Heal a Wounded World*-- published and distributed by Episcopal Relief and Development free of charge. Please sign up for these groups (the Monday evening group will be held only if we have at least 6 participants), and let me know if you would like to order a copy of the book for you.

Our support for Episcopal Community Services is another way to build our community together during Lent. This year again, proceeds from our Shrove Tuesday Pancake Support and our Soup, Bread, & Bake sale will go to ECS.

In yet another opportunity for the Lenten sharing will be to bake desserts for St. Andrew's Fish Fry on March 20th. By this fifth week of Lent, our friends at St. Andrew's begin to get tired from the weekly routine of serving dinners and baking 400 desserts, so we have offered to help during this one week.

May we treasure the simplicity of our life together during our Lenten journey this year. In the words of the Shaker song,
*'Tis the gift to be simple, 'tis the gift to be free,
'tis the gift to come down where we ought to be,
and when we find ourselves in the place just right,
'twill be in the valley of love and delight.*

We began with a brief report from each parish. At St. Andrew's, the highlights of the past few months were the Ecumenical Choral Festival and a new reflection group on biblical hospitality; St. Andrew's central effort at present is to address their budget deficit. At St. John's, the major news was the flood that has caused major damage to floors and walls in their basement schoolroom, damage that is not covered by insurance. Both congregations enjoyed their shared workshops: The discussion of *The Shack* in October and the *Painting Prayers* workshop led by Joanne Frake in January.

We discussed opportunities we would like to plan for in the coming months: a Fools for Christ clown liturgy; a bell choir recital to benefit the poor; and a Dinner Dance for adults with a DJ, probably in early September. We agreed that we would again share liturgies every day of Holy Week, developing our overnight vigil at St. John's on Maundy Thursday to include a lock-in for our youth that would combine an outreach project, prayer, music, and possibly fasting. A joint planning group will be formed to plan the Maundy Thursday dinner and overnight vigil. The St. John's representatives that St. John's would support St. Andrew's hard work during Fish Fry by baking the desserts for March 20th—the 5th Fish Fry night. This proposal brought enthusiastic gratitude from the St. Andrew's representatives.

Our next meeting will be on Monday April 20th, at 7 p.m. at St. Andrew's.

From the Bench Z y Z y Z

Epiphany, the time of the three kings, little Christmas and the period of the church year leading up to Lent. In the everyday world it is a time of Christmas returns and exchanges, thank you notes, store sales and generally bitterly cold weather. It is the restarting of yet another calendar year and in the church year, the retelling of the life of Christ. The season is symbolized by the guiding star and the related images of light.

On the first Sunday after Epiphany we mark and recall the baptism of Christ. It is a day in the church when actual baptisms are encouraged as it all fits together. However, St. John's has not had this occur in a while. The hymns tend to be of a baptismal nature, the washing clean of ones self with baptismal waters where we are "buried" with Christ and rise up to a new life. In this process we are mystically transformed and find ourselves full of something new: Grace.

On this particular Sunday we sang hymn #294, Baptized in Water. This is a newer hymn than many others in the hymnal having been written in 1977 by Michael Saward. He was born in England in 1932, schooled there and ordained to the priesthood in the Church of England in 1956. Besides serving many parishes he served as Church of England Radio and TV Officer from 1967 - 1972. He was named Vicar of Ealing Parish Church in West London in 1972. It was while he was there that he wrote "Baptized in Water" and it was published in Hymns for Today's Church. The hymn was written during a time he was teaching a series of classes about the doctrine and practice of baptism.

The tune in the hymnal supports the irregular metrical structure of the text but I have found one concentrates more on the unfamiliar music than the powerful words and imagery that the words supply. Recently, I learned the hymn can be sung to a more familiar tune: Bunesan or Morning Has Broken. We sang this hymn to that tune this past Epiphany 1 and sang it well. I hope the message and symbolism of the words gave a sense of the baptismal mystery to each one who sang.

Spiritual Benefits Givers Can Expect

Only as the world sees our faith extend to include the sacrificial giving of our energies and possessions does the power of our invisible Savior become visible to the people Christ calls us to save.
